An Act relating to sales tax; amending 68 O.S. 2021, Section 1356, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 392, O.S.L. 2025 (68 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 1356), which relates to sales tax exemption; providing exemption to entities in performance of a contract with an exempt entity; updating statutory language; and providing an effective date.

SB 710 – By Seifried of the Senate and Caldwell (Chad) of the House.

An Act relating to teacher preparation; amending Section 1, Chapter 400, O.S.L. 2025 (70 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 6-186.1), which relates to establishment of TeachForwardOK; allowing the Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability to select more than one applicant to receive certain monetary award if funds are sufficient; updating statutory references; updating statutory language; and declaring an emergency.

SB 1209 – By Kirt of the Senate and Pae of the House.

An Act relating to forcible entry and detainer; amending 12 O.S. 2021, Section 1148.4, which relates to issuance and return of summons; modifying time period for certain trial; updating statutory language; making language gender neutral; and providing an effective date.

SB 1213 – By Rader of the Senate and Harris of the House.

An Act relating to prisons and reformatories; amending 57 O.S. 2021, Section 138, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 132, O.S.L. 2025 (57 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 138), which relates to earned credits; removing incarceration length requirements for certain class levels; modifying earned credits provisions for certain inmates; updating statutory language; making language gender neutral; and providing an effective date.

SB 1256 – By Hines of the Senate and Harris of the House.

An Act relating to bail; amending 22 O.S. 2021, Section 1105, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 172, O.S.L. 2025 (22 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 1105), which relates to defendant discharged on giving bail; authorizing certain court to order ignition interlock device for certain defendants; requiring written findings for certain decisions; and providing an effective date.

SB 1287 – By Alvord of the Senate and Crosswhite Hader of the House.

An Act relating to the Oklahoma Abstractors Act; amending 1 O.S. 2021, Section 38, which relates to qualifications for issuance of license; allowing the Oklahoma Abstractors Board to deny certain applicant; updating statutory language; and providing an effective date.

SB 1405 – By Hicks of the Senate and George of the House.

An Act relating to tax refund donation; amending 29 O.S. 2021, Section 3-310, which relates to the Wildlife Diversity Fund; reauthorizing certain income tax checkoff; updating statutory language; and providing an effective date.

SB 1443 – By Daniels of the Senate and Caldwell (Chad) of the House.

An Act relating to health benefit plans; defining terms; requiring certain health benefit plans to consider certain factors when determining certain payments for certain services;

requiring certain payments to be made in certain situations; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

SB 1477 – By Seifried of the Senate and Caldwell (Chad) of the House.

An Act relating to students; amending 70 O.S. 2021, Section 5-132, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 296, O.S.L. 2025 (70 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 5-132), which relates to adult high school completion; clarifying eligibility; amending 70 O.S. 2021, Section 628.13, which relates to concurrent enrollment; prohibiting students of certain age or older from participating; updating statutory language; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

SB 1644 – By Stanley, Seifried, McIntosh and Guthrie of the Senate and Roe of the House.

An Act relating to public health; amending 63 O.S. 2021, Section 1-503, which relates to reports of disease; updating statutory language and reference; requiring addition of alpha-gal disease to list of reportable conditions; making language gender neutral; and providing an effective date.

SB 1653 – By Haste of the Senate and Miller of the House.

An Act relating to professions and occupations; enacting the Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact and authorizing the Governor to enter into the Compact with certain jurisdictions; setting forth form of the Compact; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

SB 1716 – By Howard of the Senate and Gise of the House.

[Security Breach Notification Act - class action liability - exceptions - effective date]

SB 1826 – By Reinhardt of the Senate and Osburn of the House.

An Act relating to development incentives; amending 62 O.S. 2021, Sections 842, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 203, O.S.L. 2025, and 843 (62 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 842), which relate to the Oklahoma Local Development and Enterprise Zone Incentive Leverage Act; eliminating sunset date provisions; updating statutory reference; updating statutory language; and providing an effective date.

SB 1919 – By Thompson of the Senate and Townley of the House.

An Act relating to Oklahoma Tourism Development Act; amending 68 O.S. 2021, Section 2397, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 83, O.S.L. 2025 (68 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 2397), which relates to inducement claims; increasing cumulative inducement per year; updating statutory language; and providing an effective date.

SB 1930 – By Green of the Senate and Moore of the House.

An Act relating to brine; amending 17 O.S. 2021, Sections 501, 502, 503, 504, 506, 507, 508, 510, 516, 517, and 519, which relate to the Oklahoma Brine Development Act; expanding purpose; modifying and adding definitions; clarifying certain exception; modifying provisions of certain application; modifying description of certain evidential findings; requiring certain orders remain applicable and serve as certain guidelines; removing certain single source of supply requirement; authorizing Corporation Commission to make units certain size and shape; requiring brine owners proportionally share produced water; requiring certain measurements of gross production; modifying certain plan requirements; modifying description of certain owners; authorizing proposed operator to seek certain emergency relief; requiring Commission grant relief upon certain showing; granting proposed operator right to collect certain proceeds; requiring set royalty be held in suspense until final order establishes unit; detailing requirements for certain royalty rate; modifying provisions related to changing size of certain unit; expanding applicability to

include produced water; stating certain inapplicability; expanding applicability of act to certain units; making language gender neutral; updating statutory language and references; and providing an effective date.

SB 1976 – By Green of the Senate and Boles of the House.

An Act relating to oil and gas; amending 52 O.S. 2021, Section 318.1, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 24, O.S.L. 2025 (52 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 318.1), which relates to agreement as to compliance with drilling and plugging regulations; authorizing certain operators to make voluntary election; requiring certain notice; authorizing retention of certain right; requiring certain permanence beyond expiration; requiring operators to post surety by certain date; updating statutory language; and declaring an emergency.

SB 2028 – By Wingard, Bullard, Murdock, Jett and Frix of the Senate and Hardin of the House.

An Act relating to the Oklahoma Milk and Milk Products Act; amending 2 O.S. 2021, Section 7-413, which relates to violations; expanding violations; requiring warning labels on containers of raw or unpasteurized milk and raw milk products; directing the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry to develop and produce warning labels; requiring warning label to be affixed to certain products prior to sale or distribution; authorizing the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry to promulgate rules; amending 2 O.S. 2021, Section 7-414, which relates to construction of act; allowing for certain sales of ungraded raw milk and raw milk products; restricting the advertisement of the sale of ungraded raw milk; increasing average monthly yield for incidental sales; providing for codification; and declaring an emergency.

SB 2067 – By Alvord and Mann of the Senate and Lepak of the House.

An Act relating to financial institutions; amending 6 O.S. 2021, Section 2205, which relates to the Financial Privacy Act; permitting disclosure or release of information for investigations of financial exploitation of protected adults; defining terms; requiring employees of certain institutions to notify the institution of suspected financial exploitation of a protected adult; directing certain institution to notify proper agency; permitting certain institution to notify trusted contact of suspected financial exploitation of a protected adult; authorizing temporary holds; requiring provision of certain notice of temporary hold; requiring provision of certain timeline for temporary hold; exempting notice to trusted contact if contact is suspected of financial exploitation of the protected adult; providing immunity for certain institution and employees for compliance with section; requiring retention of certain records; permitting access to certain records upon certification by an agency that an investigation into financial exploitation of a protected adult is being undertaken by the agency; authorizing certain statement containing financial information during certain time frame; requiring requests to comply with the Financial Privacy Act; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

SB 2072 – By Hamilton of the Senate and Osburn of the House.

An Act relating to conveyances; amending Section 1, Chapter 109, O.S.L. 2025 (16 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 311), which relates to notice of fraudulent conveyance; updating statutory reference; prohibiting charging of fee for certain filing; requiring certain notice to certain law enforcement agencies; and providing an effective date.

SB 2117 – By Murdock of the Senate and Archer of the House.

An Act relating to the State Board of Agriculture; amending 2 O.S. 2021, Section 2-4, which relates to the powers of Board; modifying certain authority; updating statutory language; and declaring an emergency.
