MESSAGES FROM THE SENATE

The measures were introduced and read for the first time.

SB 65 – By Weaver of the Senate and Turner of the House.

An Act relating to substance abuse services; defining terms; authorizing the possession, acquisition, distribution, and administration of emergency opioid antagonists by any person; providing criminal and civil immunities; providing for codification; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

SB 248 – By Logan of the Senate and Hill of the House.

[tourism - Revolving Fund - designation of funds - codification - effective date]

SB 330 – By Murdock of the Senate and Moore of the House.

An Act relating to the Oklahoma State University Veterinary Medicine Authority; defining terms; authorizing the Authority to conduct study on elk populations in this state; requiring a plan to be established by certain date; specifying parameters of study; requiring a management plan to be created at conclusion of study; allowing the Authority to coordinate with other agencies and experts; providing for codification; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

SB 378 – By Gollihare of the Senate and Pfeiffer of the House.

An Act relating to bail bondsmen; amending 59 O.S. 2021, Section 1306.1, which relates to multicounty agent bondsmen applications; allowing Insurance Commissioner to approve certain bondsman to write bonds over certain deposit amount; allowing Commissioner to limit written bond amount; prohibiting Commissioner from releasing certain deposit for certain time period under certain circumstances; allowing Commissioner to reduce certain deposit bond amount written over certain deposit amount; requiring Commissioner to provide certain notice; updating statutory language; updating statutory reference; and providing an effective date.

SB 844 – By Gillespie of the Senate and Hasenbeck of the House.

An Act relating to charitable organizations; creating the Safeguarding Endowment Gifts Act; providing short title; providing certain restriction; defining terms; prohibiting a charitable organization from using funds in a manner inconsistent with a donor-imposed restriction; allowing donor to file certain complaint; requiring certain notice from charitable organization; specifying remedies for violations; prohibiting this act from violating certain authority or provisions; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

SB 1204 – By Mann of the Senate and Gise of the House.

An Act relating to school employees; amending 70 O.S. 2021, Section 6-104, as amended by Section 2, Chapter 57, O.S.L. 2025 (70 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 6-104), which relates to sick leave for teachers and support personnel; requiring school districts to grant certain amount of paid bereavement leave to certain teachers and school support employees; directing bereavement leave to be in addition to certain leave due to miscarriage; prohibiting certain leave from negating certain negotiated leave policies; amending Section 7, Chapter 291, O.S.L. 2023 (70 O.S. Supp. 2025, Section 6-104.9), which relates to the Public School Paid Maternity Leave Revolving Fund; allowing fund to be used for expenses related to paid bereavement leave; updating statutory language; updating statutory references; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

SB 1330 – By Jech and Boren of the Senate and Newton of the House.

An Act relating to the Pardon and Parole Board; amending 57 O.S. 2021, Section 332.4, which relates to compensation and expenses; increasing Pardon and Parole Board member compensation; updating statutory language; and providing an effective date.

SB 1410 – By Jech and Pederson of the Senate and Patzkowsky of the House.
